The Sisters believed they had a responsibility to care for them, and that ultimately, healthier communities enable all of us to rise to a better life.

This philosophy inspires us today and guides us toward the future.

A Culture of Safety

Across PeaceHealth we are committed to a focus on quality and safety. From strategic initiatives focused on 100% Perfect Care, Zero Harm to innovative Lean transformation work, we understand that being a leader in these areas is essential to our mission and the patients, families, and communities we serve.

A culture of safety includes *every* caregiver, in every role at PeaceHealth. This is why we've implemented processes such as Safety STOP where all caregivers are empowered to 'stop the line' when they are aware of a patient safety event that could result in serious harm or death. In addition, focusing on specific workflows such as a Patient Identification ensure that any patient who comes to PeaceHealth can expect to receive safe, quality care.

The connection between safety and work/life balance cannot be overlooked. It's proven that caregivers who are able to disconnect from work have improved mental health and are less likely to make mistakes. At PeaceHealth we care for the whole person, our caregivers and patients alike.
