History



SHMC at University District had been the largest hospital in the area until SHMC at RiverBend opened in 2008, with most general services moving to the larger hospital. With the addition of two pediatric surgeons since 2013, SHMC at RiverBend is now the only hospital outside of the Portland area to offer pediatric surgery.

Geography & Economy



Eugene-Springfield is the second-largest metropolitan area in Oregon. Located in the Southern Willamette Valley, Springfield is within the Eugene-Springfield Metropolitan Statistical Area. For most of the 20th century the economy relied on the Oregon timber industry, but since the 1990s the economy has diversified with PeaceHealth now being the largest employer in the city.
